CFS UPDATE



Heading into the 23/24 bushfire season amidst one of the driest spring periods on record, our dedicated CFS volunteers embarked on the most intensive pre-season training regimen in CFS history.

This season also saw the introduction of the largest aviation fleet ever, including 4 Black Hawk helicopters, alongside enhanced

training for Incident Management Controllers and Regional Commanders, ensuring the availability of top-tier skills.

Despite the conclusion of the Fire Ban season on April 30th, the risk of bushfires persists. Over 750 Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers have already tackled more than 70 rural fire incidents, with 80% involving out-of-control burn-offs across the state. Dry fuel loads and minimal rainfall continue to elevate the risk of burn-offs escaping, so please consult the CFS website for guidance on conducting burn-offs safely.



Encouragingly, despite responding to 1,363 rural incidents and aerial support being deployed 179 times, the CFS proudly reports zero homes lost to bushfires during this bushfire season.

We are pleased to see these proactive measures mitigate the bushfire threat to South Australian communities.

CFS VOLUNTEER **PROFILE**

Terry Schutz has been a CFS currently the Swanport Group Officer, located near Murray Bridge.

Terry was deployed to Canada in 2023 to assist in battling the followed was a gruelling 39day ordeal that tested both his physical and mental resilience working on a tough 14 days on and 2 days off schedule.

Unlike the familiar terrain of Australia where fire trucks roar into action at the first sign of trouble, the Canadian wilderness presented a vastly different battleground. "There are no fire trucks used in wildfire firefighting in Canada," Terry reveals, "everything's footwork... so we would have to walk in or get dropped in by helicopter, so we spent a lot of time walking in the forest,"

Yet, the dangers extended beyond the blaze itself. Encounters with grizzly bears, moose, and even wolves added an extra layer of danger to an already hazardous

mission. "We would often see bears while driving and more worryingly while we were walking in the forest," Terry recalls.

volunteer for 25 years and is Throughout his deployment, Terry witnessed the sheer scale of devastation caused by the wildfires. Around nine large fires raged concurrently, with the Kimiwan Fire alone devouring an area equivalent to 150,000 hectares. And it didn't stop there; the fire kept growing, adding another 50,000 hectares in just 28 days.
