BUSHFIRF RECOVERY UPDATE

Following the catastrophic summer of bushfires in South Australia, we are pleased to report that rebuilding has commenced in all affected areas.



Kangaroo Island - Rebuilding of Sheds and Stock Yards

This next stage has been possible after the major effort involved in the clean-up was finalised enabling our volunteers to move forward and start rebuilding. Fences have been erected, sheds built, crops sown, vineyards

replanted, livestock purchased, and some house construction is also underway.

Tim Buck, a CFS volunteer and Kangaroo Island farmer lost everything. Tim said "the immediate support we received from the CFS Foundation was vital. It meant we didn't have to worry about how we could afford to buy important things we needed such as tools, clothes, and toys for the kids, and could focus on getting the farm back on track".

The volunteers who were affected by the fires were all so deeply grateful for the immediate financial support they received and the speed in which the CFS Foundation was able to make payments.

FROM THE FRONT LINE!

CFS volunteer Mark Sutton reflects on fighting the Cudlee Creek fire:

It was early afternoon of Friday 20 December and I was working in a CBD office that day. My phone rings and Region 4 CFS Headquarters wants a leader overnight for a Region 4 Strike Team at a big fire in the Adelaide Hills.

Fire! What fire? I get the briefing and find out that a Region 4 Strike Team is already on its way from the Mid North and I'm going to relieve them for nightshift. This was a big one!

I met the relief Region 4 Strike Team's bus at the Gumeracha Oval staging point at 10pm. The adrenalin was flowing. The outgoing Region 4 crew told stories of great saves, near misses and sad losses. It was our turn to help 'tame the beast'; a beast that had already taken so much.

We were sent to protect property in area between Gumeracha and Lobethal. It was burning all around us and I remember the radio was going crazy. It was a bit of a frenzy and we were keen to do our bit. Spot fires were threatening homes and assets everywhere, the local crews, who had been out on the fireground all day, were hopping between the taskings. It was a dynamic situation and it was hard to know what to do first because there was so much to do.

Around midnight, we were sent to help local landowners stop the fire advancing on the far north east flank of the fire on the other side of Birdwood. This was a real opportunity to stop this beast from getting bigger before sunrise and ahead of winds picking up. For the next six hours we worked with those landowners and we stopped the beast in its tracks. We established good solid fire-breaks and those containment lines held.

The sun rose to an eerie calm, smoke sat in the creek lines and the smell of fire filled the air. The black was stark but the grass in the saved paddocks gave us a great sense of achievement.

Did we tame the beast that night? History says we did not but every single firefighter who responded that day did so because they believed they could, and they really kicked that beast in the teeth.

A WORD FROM THE NEW CFS FIRE CHIEF – Mark Jones

It has certainly been a busy first few months since taking over this great Country Fire Service. We arrived in Adelaide in the late hours of 9 October last year, and I went to work early the next day, abandoning my partner in a hotel room in a city she had never seen before. Having received a hostile and unwelcoming greeting from numerous key stakeholders in the press and on radio shows, I didn't quite know what to expect. I should not have been worried as everyone in South Australia is so polite and hospitable that the criticisms of my appointment were soon forgotten.

Throughout my career, I have enjoyed a wide range of roles: firefighting, special rescue, emergency planning, health and safety enforcement, command and senior management. I thought that my main challenges early in my new job might be managerial but, within weeks, the state was ablaze. It gave me the chance to watch some great firefighters and officers at work and to command the operational strategy and image management of the Service.

The CFS crews and their emergency services partners in the Metropolitan Fire Service, State Emergency Service, SA Ambulance Service and SAPOL, were masterful. The outcomes from what were the worst set of conditions and fires the state had ever endured might have been far worse if not for their heroic efforts and bravery.

I have had a long association with firefighter charities and was a supporter of the Firefighters (national) Charity in the UK for 30 years, culminating in a term as its Deputy Chairman. Therefore, I was extremely pleased to learn of the CFS Foundation and the reason it exists.

It has already been an honour to have stood as head of such a fantastic group of people at SACFS and, while I wish our Foundation hadn't been necessary to support those who lost so much, I am truly grateful it was there and willing to assist our volunteers in their time of extreme need.

In one of the many interviews I gave at the end of 2019, I said that when nature throws the worst it can at us, the CFS does its best. That same statement could equally be made about the CFS Foundation and its magnificent supporters.

On behalf of all our volunteers who were able to benefit because of the donations made by our donor base, I say a big Thank You!
